#### **BIRDS OF THE ATLANTA AREA**

Patrick Brisse

Although Atlanta has been a center of ornithological activity for many years, little information has been published in The Oriole or elsewhere concerning the overall status of species in the Atlanta area. There have been four basic works which have attempted to detail species' status during the past fifty years. The first was Greene (1933) which for the first time listed all species known to occur in the Atlanta area. At that time the Atlanta area was considered to be the four county area consisting of DeKalb, Fulton, Clayton and Cobb counties. The next work was a list of migration extremes by Giles et al. (1934). The third work was by Griffin (1941) and was titled Migration of Birds in the Atlanta Region. This was updated in 1945 by David Johnston. After this appeared, a number of years passed before another work was published. This one by Griffin and Parks (1955) and later updated in 1962 was a comprehensive accounting of the species occurring in the Atlanta area, their status and migration extremes. This list however was never published in The Oriole. Nesting extreme dates were documented in Griffin (1940).

Since little has been published for about twenty years concerning the updated status of birds in the Atlanta area, I decided to consult various publications to bring the data up-to-date. Especially in the past 10 years many observations have been made which significantly alter the status of several species occurring in Atlanta. The publications which have been consulted include American Birds (formerly Audubon Field Notes), The Oriole, the newsletter of the Atlanta Audubon Society, The Auk and Bird Lore. In addition to the publications noted above, various unpublished data of experienced Atlanta observers were used in the preparation of this article. It should be noted here that in the past 10 years the definition of what constitutes the Atlanta area has changed from the original four county area to include now an area with a thirty-mile radius centered on downtown Atlanta (specifically at an intersection known locally as Five Points). Unpublished data were used from the following people: Jean Bevis, Donna and Patrick Brisse, Thomas Burleigh, Bill Clark, Alma Cooke, Wally Dreyfoos, Mike Einhorn, Lou Fink, Rufus Godwin, Mrs. Lewis Gordon, Doris Gray (Cohrs), William Griffin, Ethel Harris, David Johnston, William Laprade, James Major, Robert Manns, Father Martin, Terry Moore, Vaughn Morrison, Mrs. James Oliver, Richard Parks, Thomas Paxton, George Sciple, Mrs. J. M. Smith, Robert Smith, Marene Snow, John Swiderski and the Atlanta Audubon Society Migration Walks.

Abbreviations used include AAN (Atlanta Audubon Society Newsletter), AFN (Audubon Field Notes) and Birds Atlanta (Birds of the

Atlanta, Georgia Area).

An attempt has been made to adequately document each date given in the species account as to where a reader could find a specific account of the observation. The first name generally noted is the person or persons who made the observation. Hopefully this will save time in the future for anyone inquiring into the status of any individual species.

The species account follows the species order and nomenclature used in Denton *et al.* (1977). The relative abundance of the species follows closely the definitions also used in Denton *et al.* (1977). An asterisk after the species name indicates that the species has bred in the Atlanta area at least once. The 285 species described in the species account have been classified into the following groups: extinct (1), hypothetical (7), accidental (52), occasional (6), winter visitant (53), transient (58), summer visitant (6), summer resident (44), and permanent resident (58). A total of 113 species have been found nesting in the Atlanta area at least once.

Any errors are the author's responsibility. I would like to encourage anyone with information which adds to or even contradicts the status as given in the paper to communicate your data directly to me. Your information and advice will be greatly appreciated.

Black Vulture\*, Coragyps atratus, Permanent resident — uncommon. Swallow-tailed Kite, Elanoides forficatus. Accidental. 3 Sept. 1941

(Wharton, 1941, Oriole 6:50).

Mississippi Kite, Ictinia mississippiensis. Hypothetical. 11 Sept. 1958 (F. Martin, unpublished); 2 Dec. 1974 (Dreyfoos, AAN, Jan. 1975).

Sharp-shinned Hawk\*, Accipiter striatus. Winter visitant — uncommon. 11 Aug. 1981 (Moore, AAN, Oct. 1981) - 1 May 1976 (Moore, Swiderski, AAN, June 1976).

Summer records: Hembree found a nest of Sharp-shinned Hawks in Roswell "in several successive seasons." One adult was collected at the same time as the eggs on 5 June 1916 (Hembree, fide Griffin, See Burleigh, Georgia Birds).

Prairie Falcon. Falco mexicanus. Hypothetical. Early Dec. 1975 through early Jan. 1976 (fide Swiderski, 1976, American Birds 30:706); another sighting of possibly same bird was later recorded on 5 April 1976 about 20 miles from the original location (Dreyfoos, 1976, American Birds-

#### GENERAL NOTES

POSSIBLE NESTING OF VIRGINIA RAIL IN CHATHAM COUNTY — While birding on the Georgia coast between Savannah and Tybee Island, on 1 Aug. 1981, my wife and I observed a Virginia Rail (Rallus limicola) with two nearly fullgrown chicks. The size, bill, rusty color and gray cheeks were all observed on the adult Virginia Rail. The adult was also observed feeding the chicks a few times. The birds were sighted on the edge of a marsh close to the road; a line of trees separated the road from the marsh. The rails were busy feeding or being fed which explains the reason that we were able to watch them for a few minutes. It was only later, at the hotel, that we realized the rarity of a summer sighting of the Virginia Rail in Georgia. The Annotated Checklist of Georgia Birds (1977, Georgia Ornithological Society, Occasional Publication No. 6) lists the only previous nesting observations as birds found in the Atlanta area during the early summers of 1970 and 1971. Our later attempts to relocate these birds were fruitless.

RED PHALAROPE SIGHTED IN SOUTHEAST ATLANTA — On 18 September 1981 at 1130 I approached the first pond on the grounds of the Georgia Regional Hospital in southeast Atlanta. There was a large number of Killdeer (Charadrius vociferous) on the mudflats, but my attention was immediately drawn to a lone bird in the shallow water. It was obviously a phalarope, exhibiting a black ear mark and a slender neck. It was very active, moving in tight circles as it fed. The bill appeared shorter and thicker than that of a Northern Phalarope (Lobipes lobatus) or Wilson's Phalarope (Steganopus tricolor). Between the base and the tip, the bill maintained almost uniform thickness, tapering to a point only at the end. I thought that the bird might be a Red Phalarope (Pharlaropus fulicarius), but had no previous experience with the species. I made a few phone calls and by 1300 was joined by Robert Manns, Terry and Peggy Moore. At this point we were armed with a scope and several field guides.

The bird was mostly white with pearl gray back and wings, except for black or dark gray markings behind the eye, on top of the head, along the back of the neck, and along the edges of the back and wings. Some dark feathers on the back suggested that the bird had not completed its molt to winter plumage. Upon examination with a scope at 25X from about 40 meters, the bird exhibited no trace of tan or brown feathers on the back but, with the light just right, a slight yellow color was seen on the basal end of the lower mandible. A hint of rusty wash appeared on the feathers underneath this spot. When the bird made a short flight we observed a white wingstripe but no light colored "suspender" marks on the back.

Agreeing that the bird was indeed a Red Phalarope, we put the sighting on the Georgia Rare Bird Alert and the Atlanta Hotline. The bird was

subsequently seen by many observers, including Dr. Joseph Greenberg, who also confirmed the sighting.

According to the Annotated Checklist of Georgia Birds (1977, Georgia Ornithological Society, Occasional Publication No. 6) this is only the third sighting of a Red Phalarope in Georgia. One sighting was off St. Simons Island on 8 March 1975 and the other was at Thomaston on 29 October 1970.

LARK BUNTING AT CONYERS — On 12 May 1981 Ms. Sara Francis Hall reported by telephone to the Georgia Rare Bird Alert that Conyers was host to a single Lark Bunting (Calamospiza melanocorys) that had visited the feeder of Mr. and Mrs. Benny Potts since 7 May. Both women, Ms. Hall and Mrs. Potts, with the aid of field guides, properly identified the bird as an adult male.

The Lark Bunting was also seen that day from the Potts' home at a distance of about 15 meters by Joseph Greenberg, Jean Bevis and Robert Manns. The last known sighting of the bird was the following day by Peggy and Terry Moore.

Median and major wing coverts dedicated to the large white patch on each wing were easily seen while the bird was at rest, feeding and in flight. The dark conical bill and, otherwise, black plumage were noted in good light for some fifteen minutes.

The Annotated Checklist of Georgia Birds (1977, Georgia Ornithological Society, Occasional Publication No. 6) lists the Lark Bunting as accidental with previous occurrences at Tybee Island, 27 June 1952 and Athens twice, 22-25 February 1967 and 7 September 1967.

General notes on these and other species are requested for publication in the *Oriole* so that more light can be shed on their status. Original papers in the field of Ornithology are published in *THE ORIOLE* Papers are judged on their contribution of original data, ideas, or interpretation and on their conciseness, scientific accuracy, and clarity.

COPY — Type manuscripts double spaced throughout. Underscore scientific names only. Number pages in the upper right hand corner. Arrange contents in sequence: title page, text, reference, tables, figure legends, and figures. Type your complete address and date of submitting manuscript.

STYLE — The guide for preparation of copy is the STYLE MANUAL FOR BIOLOGICAL JOURNALS available from American Institute of Biological Sciences, 1401 Wilson Blvd., Arlington, Va. 22209.

TITLE — The title should be concise, descriptive, and not more than 10 words in length. Avoid use of scientific names in titles if possible.

FOOTNOTES - Avoid footnotes by incorporating such material in the text

NOMENCLATURE — Vernacular names should be capitalized in text. They are to be accompanied by appropriate scientific names the first time each species is mentioned. Show reference for long lists of scientific names (i.e., A.O.U Checklist 5th ed., 1957).

REFERENCES — When there are fewer than 3 references insert them in parentheses where needed in the text by author, journal, volume, pagination, and year of publication. Three or more references are grouped alphabetically by authors' last names under "literature cited."

TABLES — Prepare tables in keeping with size of *THE ORIOLE*. A good table should be understandable without reference to the text.

ILLUSTRATIONS — Illustrations should be suitable for photographic reproduction without retouching. Colored plates will be charged to the author.

REPRINTS — Request for reprints must be sent with original manuscript and are to be paid for by the author.

The author is responsible for putting his manuscript in final form for production. Authors should consult colleagues and specialists for review of papers before submission, and check all literature available to them that might have a bearing on their papers.
