KEYNOTE SPEAKER JULIE ZICKEFOOSE



Julie Zickefoose is a widely published natural history writer and artist. Educated at Harvard University in biology and art, she worked for six years as a field biologist for The Nature Conservancy before turning to a freelance art career. Her observations on the natural history and behavior of birds stem from more than three decades of experience in the field. She has presented illustrated lectures for nature organizations and festivals across the country, and exhibited her paintings at universities, museums, galleries, and in juried shows. Illustration credits include *The New Yorker*, *Smithsonian*, *Spider*, *Cricket*, and *Ladybug*. She has written and illustrated articles for *Country Journal*, and *Bird Watcher's Digest* has published more than 30 of Julie's articles and 17 of her cover paintings since 1986.

"LIFESTYLES OF THE SMALL AND COLORFUL: THE EASTERN WOOD WARBLERS"

Wood warblers are tropical birds that, over eons, learned to fly farther and farther north to breed. While it may spend three months on the breeding grounds, a wood warbler spends the other nine in transit and residing on the wintering grounds. In this illustrated lecture, Julie explores the enormous importance that migration has in shaping warbler lifestyles, foraging strategies, and even physiognomy.

ELBOW SWAMP WATER TREATMENT FACILITY

Leaders: Patty McLean/Kathy Miller, 10:00 AM – 2:00 PM, Maximum 15 people; 4 vehicles. Note: Meet Patty at the entrance to the facility at 11:00 AM. Every birder knows that a sewage treatment facility represents nirvana to birds. So join us for an outing to this state-of-the-art wastewater treatment plant, where wet fields, freshwater marshes, ponds and cypress swamps offer a chance to glimpse a great variety of birds. We should, at a minimum, see pipits, rails, wrens, snipe, meadowlarks, warblers, vireos, ducks and raptors.
