#### Editorial Comment

Summer birding can sometimes be rather dull and uninteresting. This late spring-summer report carries some excellent sightings. As starters, two birds not on either the official or hypothetical list were spotted in Georgia. A Baird's Sandpiper was seen at Augusta and a male Lark Bunting was spotted at Conyers.

Other good finds include: a possible Red Phalarope at Columbus; Tree Swallows successfully nesting at Lake Chatuge; White Morph of the Great Blue Heron at Newborn. An adult Bald Eagle was seen off and on throughout the summer at Carter's Lake; a first June record Marsh Hawk was sighted at Indian Springs State Park.

Olive-sided Flycatchers turned up at the Reynold's Sanctuary and on the Cohutta Ranger District, Chattahoochee National Forest. On this same district a Philadelphia Vireo was noted; one was also seen at Unicoi State Park. Connecticut Warblers were reported from Atlanta and Fairburn; a Golden-winged Warbler appeared in Dalton. Begging young House Finches were observed in East Point; a record late Evening Grosbeak was reported from Augusta.

Putting the cap on the interesting birds in this issue are sightings of an Anhinga in Bartow County; Glossy Ibis at Augusta; Sandhill Cranes at Lake Chatuge and a Sora in Atlanta.

The confusing Fall Warbler Clinic held on September 12 and 13 at the Lake Conasauga Recreation Area on the Cohutta Ranger District, Chattahoochee National Forest attracted 7 participants. On Saturday, the birds were few, although an Olive-sided Flycatcher was seen and a Swainson's Warbler was heard. A large wave of warblers was seen; but, it was too distant for any identification. Sunday, the birds really poured through the area. There were so many birds it was hard to pick one to study; Tennessee Warblers were especially numerous. A Blue-winged Warbler was among the warblers studied.

#### News of Members

Carolina Lane enjoyed a rowing trip down the Colorado River through the Grand Canyon. She said the birding wasn't all that good. #### Miscellaneous

Juvenile Cattle Egrets are being colored banded this year and also in 1982 to study post-fledgling dispersal. One or both wings may be colored with red, green, yellow, gray paint. Leg bands will be red, white, blue, green, yellow and numbered. If you see any of these birds, please note color of wing, color sequence of leg bands and numbers if possible, date and place of sighting, number of birds seen and send to Bird Banding Laboratory, Laurel, Md., 20811, and to Debbie Mignogns, P. O. Box 1490, U. of Maryland, Eastern Shore, Princess Anne, Md., 21853.

Purple Martins have been painted on the breast, wings, tails with yellow, red, blue, orange paint. Several thousand have been colored banded on the legs. Late this winter, if you see any colored banded martins on return migration, please report date, place, number of birds and color of bands to M. Kathleen Klimkiewicz, Bird Banding Laboratory, Laurel, Md., 20811.

Tom French, GOSer, working with the N. Y. Cooperative Wildlife Research Unit at Cornell University wrote to the editor: "I thought I would drop you a note as a sort of warning or prediction of a crossbill invasion. In recent years, Red Crossbills seem to have been a rather regular occurence in North Georgia; but, to the best of my knowledge, white-winged crossbills are still on the hypothetical list.

"I have just recently returned from coastal Maine and observed the greatest numbers of crossbills that I've seen there since 1972. During many summers and falls, I see no crossbills in Maine and when they do appear, Red Crossbills are usually, by far, the more common. This year I saw few reds; but hundreds of white-wings.

"They may all remain in the northern states; but, this is probably the best year in many to look for White-winged Crossbills in North Georgia." (I'm going to be out there looking! How about you? Ed.)

In a letter to the editor, Stephen Lowe of Ellijay asks for help in supporting the nongame/endangered species program in Georgia. This program has been successful; but, funds are being cut. 
