Editorial Comment

This past spring-summer quarter did not seem to produce great waves of migrants. Very few wave days were reported. It does not follow, though, that bird news is lacking. Quite the contrary, many excellent sightings were turned in.

Two birds not on the official or hypothetical lists were found - a Roseate Tern from Lake Chatuge and two sightings of Rufous-sided Humming-birds from Columbus and Hiawassee. Here and now is a good time to restate the policy of this newsletter. These are unconfirmed sightings. In two of the instances, two or more birders saw the bird. It is not the function of this newsletter to pass judgment on the accuracy of the sightings. The function of this newsletter is to bring interesting sightings to the attention of the membership. The test of sightings like the above is their acceptance for publication in The Oriole, Terry Moore, editor. If you happen onto a rare bird, or know someone who has, write it up for The Oriole.

Two birds listed as accidental for the state, a Lark Bunting, in Atlanta and a Cory's Shearwater above Georgia waters were reported. A Wilson's Storm Petrel was also spotted above Georgia waters. A Double-crested Comorant showed up at Carter's Lake, while an American Anhinga made news at Cartersville. The white morph of the Great Blue Heron was spotted at Augusta.

Roseate Spoonbills were recorded at St. Mary's and Jekyll Island. Bald Eagles appeared at Ft. Gaines, Columbus, and Lake Lanier with a possible sighting at Augusta. Bridled Terns were seen flying above Georgia waters.

To wind up the news of good sightings, a Western Kingbird was at Sandersville in June for a first June record for the state. Tree Swallows fleged young at Hiawassee for what, to my knowledge, is the first successful breeding record for the state. Also at Hiawassee, Cedar Waxwings were seen feeding young.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING OCTOBER 1, 1982 SUMMARY OF DISCUSSION

The members of the executive committee met in a brief session following the evening program at Epworth-by-the-Sea on St. Simons Island. Frank McCamey, Don Cohrs, Grady Horne, John Swiderski, Bill Gibbs, Harriett DiGioia, Georgine Pindar and Phyllis Reynolds were present.

The president indicated that changing administrative needs of the Society and revised duties of the officers should be reflected in the by-laws. These changes were discussed in some detail. Copies of the current by-laws, including revisions through 1980, were provided for members of the committee, and for any Society members wishing to have them.

The president will appoint a by-laws revision committee. Suggestions for changes in the by-laws and for people to work on the revision committee will be welcome from the Society membership.

Registration fees for the semi-annual meetings were discussed. The main question is whether non-members attending the meeting should be charged more than members. It was felt that such a differential could lead to more memberships, but it might discourage attendance by new people coming for the first time. Any ideas from the Society concerning this issue will be welcomed.

Raising the life membership fee to cover current membership costs more fully was discussed, but no action was taken. Questions were raised about who life memberships covered. The executive committee agreed that life membership is for a single individual and does not include a spouse. However, it was suggested that a family membership be established to cover this situation.

Frank McCamey reported that progress is being made on The Oriole backlog. The December 1980 issue is currently at the printer and should reach members before the end of November. Terry Moore, as new editor, and the editorial committee have established an accelerated schedule for publication of the 1981 issues.

Future meetings were discussed. An invitation from the birders in Dalton was accepted for Spring 1983, and the second vice-president was asked to seek a location on the coast for Fall 1983.
