George Dorsey Honored

NEWSLETTER OF THE GEORGIA ORNITHOLOGICAL SOCIETY

The Earle R. Greene Award for 1983 was presented to George A. Dorsey, following the banquet on October 5 at Jekyll Island, in recognition of his contributions for many years to Georgia birding and youth education.

George has been active in Georgia ornithology for more than 50 years. He is the only surviving charter member of the Atlanta Bird Club (now the Atlanta Audubon Society) from its origin in 1926, and he was a founder of the GOS in 1936.

As a nature counselor at the Boy Scout camp in Vinings, he started many boys in the study of nature, particularly birds. Some present members of the GOS came under this early influence. Later, he went to the Darlington School at Rome as a biology and science teacher. Now retired, he lives in Rome at the School where he is writing a history of that institution.

George always kept careful notes of his observations of birds and has made many contributions to The Oriole since its first year of publication. One of his special interests has been bird songs, and he became skilled at imitating birds. Many gatherings were enlivened with his imitations of bird songs and calls.

In making the presentation of an engraved plaque to George, Dr. McCamey noted George's accomplishments cited by the Earle R. Green Award committee. This committee (Doris Cohrs, Elbridge Freeborn, and Dick Parks, chairman) reviews recommendations for the GOS membership each year to select a person or organization that has made significant contributions to ornithology in Georgia.

From the Editor's Desk

Well, we hit the jackpot for birds not on the official or hypothetical lists for our state!

Five birds not on these lists were observed. These birds were Black-capped Petrel, Leach's Storm Petrel, Masked Booby, Brown Booby; all over offshore waters. A Baird's Sandpiper was seen in Clayton County.

The **Brown Booby** is listed under "Additional Species" in the Annotated Checklist of Georgia Birds, J. Fred Denton. **Baird's Sandpipers** have been seen before in the state and most likely will be included on the official list in the next revision.

Two hypothetical birds were reported. A White-tailed Tropicbird was offshore and a Clay-colored Sparrow was at Atlanta. Here, again, the Clay-colored Sparrow will probably be given official status in the next revision.

In the accidental bird department, we had two seen offshore: Audubon's Shearwater and Arctic Tern.

Rare or uncommon birds included: Wilson's Storm Petrel, offshore and a Roseate Spoonbill at Jekyll Island. Bald Eagle sightings came in from Augusta, Lake Oconee and Mineral Bluff.

A Common Moorben turned up in Banks County and a Black-bellied Plover was watched at Fort Gaines. A Whimbrel was listed from Pendergrass and a Willet at Dublin. Offshore, we had a Northern Phalarope, a Western Sandpiper was spotted at Clayton County; with a Buff-breasted Sandpiper from Dublin.

Jaegers, both Pomarine and Parasitic were seen offshore. A Gray Kingbird with young was observed on St. Simons Island. Red Crossbills were reported from the Chattahoochee National Forest.

GOS NEWS: Jekyll island Meeting a great success! 111 Birders registered; 150 species sighted. Interesting birds sighted included: Bald Eagle, Peregrine Falcon, Lesser Black-backed Gull (Ed's. Note: not on official or hypothetical list), Gull-billed Tern, Yellow-headed Blackbird. These birds were seen in October and are not included in the body of this newsletter.

The Earle R. Green Award was given to George Dorsey of Rome. His citation read: "Contributed to The Oriole, beginning with first issue, for 50 years. Teacher, student of birds, Charter member." This award is presented to the person/organization felt

BUSINESS MEETING MINUTES

The business meeting of the society was held at the Ramada Inn on Jekyll Island following the Saturday evening banquet on October 8, 1983. Frank McCamey, president, opened the meeting by expressing appreciation to Don Cohrs, Grady Horne, and Betsy Phillips for their work in arranging the meeting. He thanked Tommy Patterson for the fine presentation Friday night on the marsh birds of Georgia, illustrated by Tommy's close-up photographs of some rare species.

Actions of the executive committee meeting on Friday evening were presented in abbreviated form. McCamey announced the spring meeting will be in Atlana, May 4,5 & 6, 1984, with a program emphasizing recording an interpreting bird songs and calls. The fall 1984 meeting will be on the coast, dates to be determined.

The treasury has a balance of \$506.00 in the operating fund, and this amount must be supplemented by membership dues in 1984. There are additional funds on hand in reserve for publications. Membership currently stands at 240 (including 6 life members), plus 43 library subscriptions. Jonny Howell has worked energetically as membership secretary for more than a year, and she has been successful in bringing in

The executive committee reviewed the financing of our semi-annual meetings and determined that all meetings should be self-supporting. Accordingly, registration fees for future meetings were raised to \$5.00 per person. The GOShawk in its new format has met with approval, and the committee voted to continue the new appearance for at least two more issues, at a cost of about \$200 per issue which means an increase of about \$60 per issue over the former costs.

Action was taken to join the Georgia Environmental Council for \$20.00 and the Georgia Conservancy as a corporate member for \$35.00. Milton Hopkins asked for a few minutes to explain why he could not accept the nomination for president at this time, and his withdrawal was accepted by the executive committee.

The slate of officers proposed by the nominating committee was presented as follows:

Tommy Patterson, First vice-president; Dave Reynolds, Second vice-president; John Swiderski, Treasurer; Betsy Phillips, Secretary

McCamey then opened nominations from the floor, and Bob Manns was nominated for president. No additional nominations were received, and McCamey directed the secretary to cast one ballot for the slate as presented and amended. This was done with no dissenting votes from the Society members present.

The Earle R. Green Award was presented to George A. Dorsey for his contributions to birding. (See more detail in the president's notes.) The committee reviewing recommendations for this award consists of Doris Cohrs, Eldridge Freeborn, and Dick Parks, chairman.

Terry Moore reported briefly on the publication schedule for The Oriole as he brings it up to date. He urged members to get their articles and notes in soon to maintain the accelerated schedule.

John Swiderski thanked Frank McCamey for his work as president of the Society for the last four years, particularly his efforts to enlarge the life membership fund, to organize the regional field trips between regular meetings, and to promote the GOS throughout the state.

Don Cohrs conducted the bird countdown which came to 150 species, one of the highest counts ever for a single day on the coast. Don also announced than the banding station would be in operation and open to the public on the south beach of Jekyll Island on Sunday.

He then introduced Bob Manns for a brief presentation on binoculars. Bob reviewed some of the new types available to birders, discussed quality, had samples available for members to examine, and offered to check the alignment of anyone's glasses on Sunday.

Don then introduced our feature speaker, Dr. Sidney Gauthreaux, Jr., professor of ornithology at Clemson University. His program on "New Trends in Tracking Bird Migration with Radar" was splendid. He presented illustrations of the equipment used and explanations of the results being obtained. He continued the program outdoors to demonstrate his radar picking out the invisible birds moving overhead. He stated that a mile-wide band of sky might pass more than half a million birds on a single night of good migration. The meeting then adjourned. Respectfully submitted.

MERRY PONDS January 21, 1984

A mid-winter trip for ducks will show you a great place to see them close by on small ponds. Anne and Vernon say they expect all of Georgia's inland ducks, plus geese and cormorants, Ring-billed, Herring and Bonaparte's Gulls. Whitecrowned and Vesper Sparrows are regular, as well as House Finches.
