

Atlanta plans a great spring meeting this year, jointly hosted by a **committee of GOS** members and the Fernbank Science Center. With a variety of programs, social gatherings, banquet and field trips, you'll want to be there—and advance planning is necessary. Please help by returning your registration form before April 20.

Fernbank provides facilities for all activities on Friday. Registration begins at 3:00 p.m., continues to 10:00 p.m. When you register, allow time to look around at the splendid environmental exhibits of the Science Center - you could spend hours here!

You <u>must</u> register and obtain your name tag for admission to all scheduled activities. If you don't get to Fernbank by 10:00 p.m., please register at the Holiday Inn, starting at 6:00 a.m. on Saturday.

For the evening program, we have **Price Webb** showing his splendid photographs of nesting birds. At 9:00 p.m. we will break to review field trip plans, clear up questions, and enjoy refreshments (cover charge of \$1.00 per person, get tickets at registration).

### From the Editor's Desk:

With this edition of the GOShawk, we will be using the new names and following the new order of birds according to the Sixth Edition of the American Ornithologists' Union (AOU) Checklist of North American Birds.

George Dorsey, very kindly, sent me a list of new names and order of the birds listed in the Annotated Checklist of Georgia Birds, J. Fred Denton. I am much indebted to you, George, and thank you for working up and sending me this list.

I would like to quote the following from George's letter: "The new AOU Checklist of (Continued on page 2)

Field trips start early Saturday morning, radiating out of Atlanta to our best birding areas. All trips will be guided by experienced birders, limited to 15 participants in each group, and end about 12:30 p.m. If requested, we can repeat some of the trips on Sunday morning.

Advanced registration is necessary for the field trips because the group size is limited, some trips will use bus transportation, and the trips start at different points around the city. Please read the field trip descriptions in this newsletter, and indicate your choice on your registration form.

One new type of trip will be offered this year, rafting for birds on the Chattahoochee River. Rafts, safety equipment, bus transportation and lunch (on Sunday) will be provided by an experienced river outfitter. Trips will run on Saturday afternoon and Sunday morning, with a minimum of 10 people and a maximum of 20 (in 5 rafts). If these trips are oversubscribed, preference will be given to GOS members who register in advance by mail.

North American Birds has been published in 1983. This is the sixth edition, and each time a new edition of the checklist appears, there have been a good many changes. This new edition is no exception.

"In this new checklist have been included the birds of the Hawaiian Islands, Central America through Panama, and the islands of the West Indies. Since this wider coverage has increased the number of species a good bit, therefore the Checklist Committee has confined the list to only the species level. No subspecies are shown.

"One change that will be difficult for many of us to understand is that the former finch group has separated into two families: the Emberizidae and the Fringillidae. In the Emberizidae are placed the wood warblers, the tanagers, the cardinal and other birds (Continued on page 6)



through snow bunting, followed by the blackbird group. In a separate family, the Fringillidae, are such birds as purple finch, the crossbills, the siskins, American Goldfinch, and evening grosbeak. For our (Georgia) lists, the House Sparrow will be placed at the last, although it is not the last bird listed in the Checklist...".

Here is a listing of the <u>new common names</u>. You will notice the new order as you read the bird news: Gannet to Northern Gannet; White Pelican to American White Pelican; Louisiana Heron to Tricolored Heron; Green Heron to Green-backed Heron; American Flamingo to Greater Flamingo; Whistling Swan to Tundra Swan.

Also: Black Duck to American Black Duck; Pintail to Northern Pintail; Swallow-tailed Kite to American Swallow-tailed Kite; Marsh Hawk to Northern Harrier; Turkey to Wild Turkey; Bobwhite to Northern Bobwhite; Common Gallinule to Common Moorhen; American Golden Plover to Lesser Golden-Plover; Black Oystercatcher to American Black Oystercatcher; Northern Phalarope to Red-necked Phalarope.

Outstanding birds reported for this fall-early winter quarter in Georgia include one hypothetical list and one accidental bird. Our hypothetical is a Hudsonian Godwit from Sea Island. The accidental is a Reddish Egret from St. Simon's Island.

Other good birds included: Red-throated Loon from Lake Conasauga; Cormorants off Carter's Lake. Both these lakes are in Northwest Georgia. American Swallow-tailed Kites were noted over the Satilla River and Bald Eagles were spotted at Lake Jackson, Savannah, Buena Vista and Carter's Lake.

Peregrine Falcons were listed from Jekyll Island; Sandhill Cranes flew over Whitfield County, Lake Conasauga and Statesboro. A Black-bellied Plover was studied at Cartersville; a Sanderling at Pendergrass. A Lawrence's Warbler comes from Augusta; while Red

Atlanta offers a wide range of overnight facilities, and you can choose from rooms simple or elaborate, economical to expensive. You may even wish to try old-style "tourist" accommodations in a private residence in our MHA program (Member's Home Accommodation).

Conference motel will be the Holiday Inn, on I-85, just outside the I-285 perimeter. The management has granted us a very special rate of \$50.00 per room for a two-night stay (\$30.00 per room for one night). All rooms have 2 double beds and children stay free in the parents' room. To highlight the afternoon program we have **Ben B. Coffey**, of Memphis, Tennessee, to tell us about birding by sound. Ben has travelled widely through the U.S., Central and South America for 25 years to find and record the vocalizations of many species, often shy and little-known birds of the night in tropical jungles. His recordings have gone into the ornithological archieves of the Cornell Laboratory of Ornithology and the University of Florida for study by scientists investigating bird behavior and taxonomy with this new technique.

Other speakers for shorter presentations will be:

**Terry Moore**, editor—The Oriole, reviewing policies and plans for our quarterly bulletin as it grows and improves with the Society.

Don Cohrs on Jekyll Island banding work. Don will present the results of netting and banding for six years on the barrier island. He has planned and conducted this program for a week every fall as part of a national program to study fall migration along the coast.

Department of Natural Resources on wildlife restoration. Working with several species of birds, the DNR has achieved splendid success in bringing back to Georgia native wildlife that was nearly lost. We want to hear about the Wild Turkey, the Wood Duck and the Bald Eagle.

Tommy Patterson presents "My Marshbird Records". Tommy has concentrated for 25 years on finding unusual marsh birds migrating or nesting in central Georgia. His records are often documented with splendid color slides that he will bring to show us. Georgann Schmalz has researched the red wax tips on the Cedar Waxwing. Did you ever wonder what it is and why it is there? Find out now, with Georgann's report of new information on this odd material.

### GOS MEETING - FIELD TRIPS May 5, 1984

### SWEETWATER CREEK STATE PARK

West of Atlanta, 9 miles from I-285. Meet at the park for an easy 2-mile hike along the creek to the factory ruins. Spring migrants and riparian species,  $3\frac{1}{2}$  hours.

# CHATTAHOOCHEE RIVER NATIONAL RECREATION AREA (Cochran Shoals) CHATTAHOOCHEE NATURE CENTER

North side of Atlanta, 2 miles through open fields and woodland edge, the best area in Atlanta to find spring migrants of all kinds. Bus transportation from the Holiday Inn to the NRA; board bus at north end of Cochran Shoals for transportation to Nature Center for an hour on nature trails, and return by bus to Holiday Inn.

### FERNBANK FOREST/ EMORY PRESIDENT'S ESTATE

Meet at Fernbank Science Center for walk on paved path through the Fernbank Forest. The mixed deciduous forest is good for warblers, tanagers, woodpeckers, other migrants.

# CLAYTON COUNTY WATER TREATMENT PLANT REYNOLDS NATURE PRESERVE

South side of Atlanta, on SR 41, 10 miles south of I-285, best place for shorebirds on the settling ponds of the water treatment plant. Woodland species will be seen in the 120-acre old growth forest of the nature preserve, all easy walking on trails.

### FAIRBURN ROAD/CAMPCREEK PARKWAY

Southwest of Atlanta, meet at Greenbriar Shopping Center, to visit 4 different locations in South Fulton County. Swamp and pasturelands, mixed hardwoods for Swainson's Warbler and Willow Flycatcher. Wet area, wear appropriate shoes.

### ROGERS BRIDGE/CHATTAHOOCHEE RIVER

Along the river, 20 miles northeast of Holiday Inn, several areas of river floodplain will be visited. Spring migrants and shorebirds will be found, and you'll get wet feet. Start from Holiday Inn by ear pool.

### STONE MOUNTAIN STATE PARK

Start from Holiday Inn to bird in the 700-acre park, a major tourist attraction of Atlanta, 4 miles east of I-285. Easy walking and riding through second growth oak forest, open fields, and around lakes for spring migrants. Lunch at the Inn, ride the skylift if you wish.

### CHATTAHOOCHEE RIVER RAFT TRIP

Drift easily with the current on the Chattahoochee River, about 5 miles. You will see aquatic species, plus warblers in the overhanging willows and birches. This is a good introduction to rafting for the novice — you can safely carry your binoculars but you may get your feet wet. 
