MAY GOS MEETING - A Great Success!

The May meeting in Atlanta was a success! A grand total of 124 species were recorded by 98 registered birders. The weather was cooperative—good birding weather and all field trips went as scheduled.

Price Webb gave a most impressive slide program, Bird Life at the Nest, on Friday evening. The paper sessions Saturday afternoon were stimulating and very well attended and received. Ben Coffey's Birding By Sound introduced us to some new calls/songs of birds unfamiliar to many of us. And Lula Coffey's banquet presentation about their sound recording trips to South America was well done and will not be soon forgotten.

FROM the EDITOR'S DESK

Look's like we hit the jack pot on birds not on the official or hypothetical list for Georgia. Seven birds were sighted this past reporting period.

Northern Fulmar east of St. Catherine's Island; Manx Shearwater off Jekyll Island; Black-capped Petrel off our coast; Harlequin Duck on Tybee Island; Northern Goshawk from Athens and Winder; Lesser Black-backed Gull off the

coast and Say's Phoebe from DeSota make up the roster of birds not on either list.

Plus we had two hypothetical list birds: Curlew Sandpiper from Savannah and Black-legged Kittiwake off the coast.

Other interesting birds sighted include: from Sapelo Island—Red-necked Grebe, Oldsquaw, Peregrine Falcon. An American White Pelican was reported from Jekyll Island.

The Great Cormorant, first reported in the last issue, was still in Lee County; Tundra Swans showed up at Augusta. Bald Eagle reports came in from Lake Oconee and Sapelo Island. Over on the Lookout Plateau, Rough-legged Hawk and two Golden Eagles were listed. From Dalton, Columbus and Atlanta came reports of Virginia Rails.

Lesser Golden Plover turned up in Whitfield and Houston Counties and DeSota. From offshore came reports of Red Phalarope and Razorbill. Lark Sparrows were listed from Whitefield County and Athens; while Henslow's Sparrows were sighted at Everett and Sapelo Island. Lapland Longspurs came in from Gainesville and Macon with Red Crossbills being sighted at Lake Burton, Atlanta, and the Cohutta Ranger District of the Chattahoochee National Forest.

**Chattahoochee Nature Center, Inc.
JOHN JAMES AUDUBON EXHIBITION**

The Chattahoochee Nature Center will sponsor a major exhibition on the life and works of John James Audubon, the famous naturalist-artist. The exhibition opens to the public Monday, September 10 and will run through Monday, October 7.

The Museum hours are 9-5 Monday through Saturday and 10-5 Sunday. Admission will be charged.

A satellite exhibit promoting this event will be on display at Neiman-Marcus, Lenox Square, from September 10 through September 22.

The exhibition consist of a collection of 40 original double-elephant prints of John James Audubon and an original copperplate from the collection of The Massachusetts Audubon Society, plus Audubonalia from the Smithsonian, The New York Historical Society, and The Academy of Natural Science in Philadelphia.

In addition to the exhibition, many educational programs have been planned which include a one-man characterization, films, guest speakers, and an engraving demonstration.

The Chattahoochee Nature Center is sponsoring a Georgia Tour of the exhibit as well. It will travel to Callaway Gardens for their Chrysanthemum Weekends beginning October 13 and running through October 21. The exhibit will be on display in their new John A. Sibley Horticultural Center. On October 13, Neiman-Marcus will present a fall fashion show at the Horticultural Center in celebration of this exhibition.

October 27th the exhibit will open at Bulloch Hall in Roswell, the home of President Theodore Roosevelt's mother, Mittie Bulloch. It will commemorate his 126th birthday and tie in his great achievements in conservation. The exhibit will remain until Sunday, November 11. The end of the Tour will be hosted by Georgia Southern Museum in Statesboro from November 26 - December 10.
