FROM THE EDITOR'S DESK

We had four birds reported this quarter that are not on the official or hypothetical lists for Georgia. Black-capped Petrel off the coast, Harlequin Duck on Tybee Island, Say's Phoebe at De Sota and a Painted Redstart from Crooked River State Park. The Harlequin Duck and Say's Phoebe were first reported in the last issue of this newsletter.

One hypothetical list bird was seen - a Franklin's Gull at Lake Chatuge. Three accidental birds were sighted: Cory's Shearwater off Savannah, Audubon's Shearwater off Savannah and an Arctic Tern off our coast.

Other noteworthy birds reported for the past quarter included: Greater Shearwater and Wilson's Storm Petrel off Savannah and the coast; Snowy Egret at Atlanta and a Tricolored Heron in Murray County. A Roseate Spoonbill was spotted at Brunswick and Wood Storks were at Americus and Riceboro. A Tundra Swan turned up at Atlanta and an Oldsquaw were at Augusta.

Bald Eagle sightings came in from Albany, Commerce Lake, Darien, Lake Harding, Harris County and McIntosh County. A Golden Eagle was seen on the Lookout Plateau (before the hacking began). A Virginia Rail was at Richmond Hill State Park and Sandhill Cranes were over Atlanta, Pendergrass, Dillard. A Black-bellied Plover was watched at the Clayton County Water Treatment Plant; a Willet was in Atlanta. Also from the water treatment plant comes a Wilson's Phalarope. Bridled Terns were off the coast; a Warbling Vireo showed up in Atlanta and a Sutton's Warbler was sighted in Screven County.

MINI REVIEW OF GOS MEETING JEKYLL ISLAND - OCTOBER, 1984

YOUR ASSISTANCE IS NEEDED

Joe P. Myers needs your help to study staging areas. "Damage to some habitat along the migration route of certain shorebirds may be more devastating than might first appear. There exist special 'staging areas' at which migrating birds customarily halt to replenish exhausted energy. A whole population may pass through one of these 'bottlenecks'. To the extent that the site is destroyed by wetlands reclamation or other human activity, the entire population of the species using that staging area will be endangered. Volunteers are needed for further research on these staging areas." Contact J. P. UPCOMING MEETINGS

Final plans for the Fall meeting on Jekyll Island were discussed as was the location for the Spring 1985 meeting. Joe Greenberg and Dave Reynolds are working on this. Two possibilities are Fitzgerald, Georgia or a joint meeting with Alabama Ornithological Society, possibly in Eufaula.

MEMBERSHIP AND FINANCES

John Swiderski reported we currently have 363 members, of whom 20 have not renewed their memberships. He also said he is holding cash on reserve for the publication of A Birder's Guide to Georgia, but has invested some funds in a money market investment. He reported the ABA is planning to buy some of our stock of check lists.

A BIRDER'S GUIDE TO GEORGIA is in the final revision stages which were discussed at this meeting. Bob Manns will write the Editorial Committee giving them our thoughts. Publication should be fairly soon.

RARE BIRD ALERT

Don and Joyce Duncan, who are located geographically in the center of the state, have agreed to coordinate this project. They will be forming a committee to handle this. We have asked them to check into answering machines for which we have some funds from the previous attempt. Hopefully, the RBA will be reactivated soon.

GEORGIA CONSERVANCY

We have decided to renew our membership but will use Harriett DiGioia's address so that she will have access to Georgia environmental news should she want to include it in the Goshawk.

MISCELLANEOUS

Terry Moore reported that the Carolina Bird Club is having a winter meeting in Savannah in which some of our members might be interested. Printing of the Goshawk in its present format is fairly expensive, and will probably be reviewed in the near future. The Executive Committee has decided guidelines of the officers' duties to compliment and/or elaborate on those in the by-laws is a good idea. Each member has been asked to draft a copy for review. The Check List Committee's proposed criteria for inclusion on the state list were presented.
