Rare Bird Alert

A rare bird alert for Georgia is, once again, a reality! Complete with automatic telephone answering system, the central reporting station will be at the home of Don and Joyce Duncan in Kathleen, Georgia with sub stations in Atlanta, Dublin, Eufaula, and St. Simons Is.

The Purpose: To enable greater numbers of interested persons to observe and document rare birds in Georgia.

The Objective: To disperse reported sightings as quickly as possible in order to increase chances of viewing the bird before it makes its "get away". Within minutes after a report is received, phones will be ringing.

The Method: GOS members who wish to be notified of each rare bird sighting must send \$5.00 and current phone number to GOS treasurer, John Swiderski. This fee is necessary to cover long distance calls.

ANYONE, paid subscriber or not, who observes a rare bird in Georgia is encouraged to report the sighting PROMPTLY to Don or Joyce Duncan, phone no. 912-987-1052. Observers please include information such as: (1) pertinent field marks, (2) date and time seen, (3) where seen and directions, (4) your name and phone number plus, if available, any other contacts willing to guide or give directions to bird's location.

A guide line on birds to report follows; however, please do not hesitate to call in sightings of unusual birds if unsure of their status.

Records listed in this newsletter are largely unchecked and do not constitute an official sighting. Publication of these records is intended to bring interesting sightings to the attention of the membership and to remind them to be alert to unusual species in the areas indicated.

An asterisk (*) following the name of a bird denotes that it is listed as occasional, rare, uncommon or casual for one of the locations where it was seen according to the Annotated Checklist of Georgia Birds, J. Fred Denton. Editor's notes and dates in parentheses are taken from this checklist.

From the Editor's Desk

We are still chalking up the birds not found on the official or hypothetical lists for Georgia. Seven birds falling in this category were reported for the past quarter.

An Eared Grebe was spotted at the Clayton County Water Treatment Plant; Black-capped Petrels were studied offshore. Two birds listed under the "Accidental Seabirds" section in A Field Guide to the Birds East of the Rockies, Roger Tory Peterson, were found offshore; Band-rumped Petrel and Red-billed Tropicbird.

A Masked Booby was noted offshore of Cumberland Island and a Baird's Sandpiper turned up at the Clayton County Water Treatment Plant. A Rufous Hummingbird was found at Duluth.

One hypothetical list bird was turned in: Long-tailed Jaeger offshore of Cumberland Island.

Two birds listed as "Accidentals" were seen offshore: Cory's and Audubon's Shearwaters.

Georgia Tax Checkoff Bill should be reintroduced in the upcoming legislative
session. Please lend your support to the passage of this bill.

GOShawk. We have voted to continue the current format for the next two issues
while checking into possible cost reductions in order to maintain this format.
A decision will be made at the April meeting as to which format to use. The
current one has cost more than the budget allows.

Upcoming Meetings. The Spring meeting will be held at Eufaula, Alabama, April
19-21, 1985. The Fall meeting will be held on the coast (date and location to

and/or decal. A committee is being formed to start planning.

Shooting of the Northern Goshawk. Our attempts to pursue the matter with U. S.
Fish and Wildlife have gotten us nowhere. We are writing our U. S. Congressmen
and Senators for additional assistance.

Miscellaneous. Carolina Lane is our new Business Manager. We have authorized
the Editorial Committee to proceed with the publication of Bob Lofton's paper,
"References to Georgia Birds in American Birds". We will donate some surplus
copies of Milton Hopkins' The Birdlife of Ben Hill County, Georgia and Adjacent
Areas to libraries around the state and include a flyer announcing the avail-
ability of the revised A Birder's Guide to Georgia. Membership was discussed.
The suggestion was made that each members try to solicit a new member.
