We have two birds reported that are on the Hypothetical Species List for our state. A Ringed Turtle-dove in Cadwell and a Burrowing Owl seen at Gainesville.

From offshore of Jekyll Island come reports of Audubon's Shearwater and Wilson's Storm Petrel. Roseate Spoonbills were reported from Millen, Cadwell; Bald Eagle and Peregrine Falcon sightings came in from various sections of Georgia. A Baird's Sandpiper was spotted at Lake Lanier.

A Rufous Hummingbird was at Rum Creek Wildlife Management Area and Scissor-tailed Flycatchers showed up in Columbus and Adairsville. From Dawsonwood Rd. (? as to location) came a Brewster's Warbler sighting; a Lawrence's Warbler was seen at Augusta. Red Crossbills were once again on the Cohutta Ranger District of the Chattahoochee National Forest and at Blue Ridge.

GOS Annual Spring Meeting and Field Trips

Plan now to attend the annual Spring Meeting, April 21-23, 1989. The meeting headquarters will be the new Shoney's Inn in Fitzgerald, Georgia. Program designed to add to your enjoyment and knowledge of birding are scheduled for Friday and Saturday evenings.

Here's the chance to bird the upper coastal plain of mid-south Georgia. Field trips will be led by knowledgeable local birders. Five large heronries, one with 3,000+ birds, are within 35 to 40 miles of Fitzgerald. The nearby Alapaha River features nesting sites of many wet woodland species. Also near are mud flats, a wastewater treatment facility, and 3 oxidation ponds, all frequented by shorebirds. The terrain includes natural and planted stands of pines, sand ridge and scrub oak, plus numerous streams and ponds followed by birds migrating at this time.

Species we may see include: egrets; herons; Anhingas; White Ibis, Moorhen; Acadian Flycathers; Cerulean, Kentucky, Yellow-throated and Swainson's Warblers; Mississippi and Swallowtail Kites.

October 7-9, 1988

President Don Duncan opened the Saturday evening general membership meeting with a welcome to all members attending. All of the field trip leaders were recognized and thanked. Mention was made of the updated Birders Guide to Georgia and other GOS publications available in the rear of the room.

Georgine Pindar briefly covered the Fort Frederica problem, gave the address for writing letters of opposition, and encouraged everyone to do so.

The Earl R. Greene award was presented to Frank McCamey by Richard Parks. Frank has been active in GOS for 12 years, and has been involved in working with nature since college. He attended Yale University and holds a Ph.D. degree from Connecticut in forestry. He has worked with nature centers in Cincinnati, Ohio, and in Michigan. He came to Atlanta as Regional Director of the National Youth Foundation. He has held all offices of GOS and has devoted many long years to the environment.

Vice President Branch Howe introduced John "Barney" Dunning, the speaker who gave a very interesting and well-presented slide lecture on "Bachman's sparrows in South Carolina". Many questions from the audience were addressed.

Vernon Waters conducted the weekend countdown, with a total of 113 species observed.

The GOS Spring Meeting in Fitzgerald, Georgia, April 21-23, 1989, at the Shoney's Inn was announced.

Vernon Waters thanked everyone for their concern and letters helping to get the highway through Merry Bothers Ponds rerouted through Phinezy Swamp.

The meeting was adjourned.

ABSTRACT OF THE GEORGIA ORNITHOLOGICAL SOCIETY MINUTES OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

October 8, 1988

Epworth-by-the-Sea, St. Simons Island, Georgia

FINANCIAL REPORT: Current funds are \$30,864. There are 133 life members, 195 regular members, and 75 library members for a total of 403. GOS has sent a \$1,000.00 donation to the Roger Tory Peterson Institute.

ACTIVITY, RESPONSIBILITY, STATUS REPORT: Terry currently has sufficient material for his continuing work on The Oriole. Harriett has sent the GOShaw to the typist. The next issue will be out soon.

The updated <u>Birders Guide to Georgia</u> is now available for \$6.00, or \$7.00 if mailed. the new "Checklist of Georgia Birds" is also available, with the MacGillivray's Warbler being the only addition.

Conservation updates were presented on Merry Ponds/Phinezy Swamp, Lake Alma (Hurricane Creek), the Sea Palms Proposal at Fort Frederica, Swamp of Toa, and Congressional Bills concerning Clean Air, the Tongass, and the North Slope.

GOS Annual Spring Meeting will be held at Shoney's Inn, Fitzgerald, Georgia on April 21-23, 1989. Tentative sites for the fall 1989 meeting were discussed, including Charleston, South Carolina and Savannah.

The Jekyll Island Banding Station (JIBS), as the only long-term ongoing ornithological project in Georgia, will be encouraged to present a compilation of data for publication.

It was suggested that we find ways to utilize the talented members of our organization. Possible ways of creating more interest are more field trips and reviving the presentation of scientific papers during annual meetings.

News of People

GOSer Delano Crowe died on December 15, 1988. He had been ill for a few years. We extend our deepest sympathy to his family.

GOSer Jeannine Angerman died on February 1. She became ill with cancer last year; but remained active until she was hospitalized a few weeks before her death. Our sympathies are with her family.

Travelers: Davis Bulluck and Andy Griner spent 16 days in Mali, West Africa in January of '88. Although not a birding trip, they did identify 85 species. The only one they seen before was the Cattle Egret.

Joel Hitt spent some time in West Virginia; Ken and Lil Dubke went over to Mississippi; Anne and Vernon Waters went out Colorado way, stopping at Guadalupe Mountains National Park. Here they saw a White-eyed Vireo, Scott's Oriole. In Colorado, they listed Band-tailed Pigeon, White-throated swift, Golden Eagle. Arlene Cark birded out in Oregon and saw Snowy Plover, Marbled Murrelet, Black Turnstone.

Anselm Atkins ventured over to Texas. Golden-fronted Woodpecker, Ringed Kingfisher, Golden-cheeked Warbler wre tallied. Ty Ivey wandered a bit further afield, journeying to the Pribilof Islands. He gained 31 birds for his Life List, including Gray-tailed Tattler, Glaucous Gull, Smith's Longspur. Al Jenkins went even further, going to China. "Not one of the greatest trips for Lifers, but historically interesting and scenic", he said.

This brings us to Helen Ogren. Helen won a trip to the Falkland Islands. She pledged money to last year's American Birds team on their Big Day Count. Her team won. All pledgers names were put in a hat and two lucky people would win the trip. Well, Helen's name was drawn. She flew to London, England, boarded an RAF Tristar Troop Carrier, complete with troops and flew to the Falkland Islands. They refueled at the Ascension Islands. She saw King, Gentoo, Magellanic, Rock Hopper Penguins while there. There were 15 birders on the trip, one other American winner from Colorado and the rest were English with one Scotsman. Helen said it was a great trip.
