Georgia's First Ever Birding Festival COLONIAL COAST BIRDING AND NATURE FESTIVAL

The Festival will begin on October 10th with a field trip to Okefenokee National Wildlife Refuge, followed by seminars on gulls and terns (taught by Kenn Kaufman), shorebirds (Brad Winn), and documenting wildlife sightings (Jonas Jordan). That first day will conclude with a birthday bash to celebrate the centennial of the National Wildlife Refuge system. The featured speaker for the party will be Bill Hartwig, Chief of the National Wildlife Refuge System. Peter Stangel of the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation will serve as the master of ceremonies (MC) for that evening, and Pierre Howard will be the MC for Saturday night at the Festival.

The list of field trips for Saturday and Sunday includes Okefenokee NWR, Harris Neck NWR (two each day), Altamaha WMA, Little St. Simons Island, Blackbeard NWR (two each day), Jekyll Island (three trips each day including a natural history tour), Savannah NWR (two each day), Sapelo Island (Two on Saturday, one on Sunday), Savannah-Ogeechee Island, Wassaw NWR, Moveable Feast, Jekyll Island Banding Station, and birding by kayak tours of Melon Bluff, St. Simons Island, and the marshes of Glynn County. Seminars on Saturday afternoon feature choosing optics, Wood Stork status, Swallow-tailed Kite status, creating backyard habitats for birds, birding for kids, birding by ear, birds of the long-leaf pine ecosystem, Native American bird lore, hummingbirds of Georgia, increasing your bird list, confusing

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fall warblers, bird photography, barrier island ecology, and gardening with native plants. As if this isn't enough, the agenda will also provide opportunities for exhibitors such as binocular sales companies to show off their wares. Saturday afternoon will also include a brief GOS business meeting to elect officers at the Convention Center at 4:30 p.m., followed by a GOS poster session from 4:00 until 6:30 p.m. The evening will conclude with a low country boil banquet including vegetarian meal options, and a presentation by author and birder extraordinaire Kenn Kaufman, the evening's guest speaker.

The registration booklet for the Festival should be available for distribution during the week of August 11th. The booklet will be distributed by mail, and the registration form will be available at the Festival website (http://www.shrike.net/ccbf/) and the GOS website (http://www.gos.org). The entire registration process, including sign ups for field trips and seminars, will be done by mail. There will not be an option to register electronically. Advance registration will begin on August 15th and end on September 30th. You will be asked to complete a registration form and mail with a check or money order, made payable to Coastal Georgia Audubon Society. The mailing address will be provided in the booklet.

Registrants will receive a packet containing written confirmation of all of your registered events plus any other pertinent information. Field trip registration will be on a first-come first-served basis. If a trip(s) you choose is sold out, you will be contacted and asked to select an alternate trip(s). Upon arrival at the Festival you will need to check-in at the registration desk located inside the Jekyll Island Convention Center where all preregistered guests will receive a welcome tote-bag containing tickets to all of your registered events, maps to field trip locations, and various other goodies.

Festival registration will cost \$25, and the banquet charge will also be \$25. GOS members will receive a \$10 discount off the cost of registration. There will be a minimum fee of \$5 for field trips, and some will be as high as \$30-49. All seminars except those scheduled

The former committee which consisted of Chuck Hunter, Chairman, Giff Beaton, Bruce Hallett, John Parrish, Paul Sykes and Bill Blakeslee, Secretary, worked many hours to bring the committee records up to date. They carried out considerable research to develop and enhance the species accounts which appear in the new ACOGB. Beaton, Parrish and Sykes brought the ACOGB manuscript to completion. The normal term on the committee is six years. However the committee terms were extended until the ACOGB was published and as a result several served as much as ten years. Presidents Message FOR BIRDING ENTHUSIASTS

The new edition of the Annotated Checklist of the Birds of Georgia is out and is very impressive. This fifth edition informs us that there are now 407 birds on the Regular Species List in Georgia. On noting taxonomic changes it can be seen that the Rufous-sided Towhee has been split into Eastern Towhee and Spotted Towhee and that BOTH have occurred in Georgia. But not to worry. It's not likely that the towhee in your yard might be a Spotted, as there has only been one observance of the Spotted in the state (Cobb County, 2000) and it is thus on the Accidental list. The increase of 37 species, up from the 370 reported on the Regular list in the 1986 edition, appears to be the result of increased observations of species and/or better documentation, rather than from specie splits. Of these 407 species on the Regular list, 185 have been documented as breeding in Georgia. This checklist will be an indispensable reference for Georgia birders for years to come. For the dedicated birder, it serves as an impetus to carefully observe and identify birds and to provide the best documentation possible for unusual occurrences.

This guide, along with the explosion of other bird books and guides, serves the growing birdwatching community. A U.S. Fish and Wildlife survey published a couple of years ago revealed that the number of people in this country who regularly watch birds has grown to 46 million, of which, 18.3 million are considered "serious birders" (e.g., they travel to places to see birds). This growth has undoubtedly spurred the development of birding trails in many states (see www.audubon.org/bird_trails for a listing), including our own. The Georgia Colonial Coast trail features 18 sites and there will be fieldtrips to many of these locations in conjunction with the upcoming Colonial Coast Birding and Nature Festival, details of which are provided in this newsletter.

So, I encourage all "serious" birders as well as less serious "enthusiasts" to purchase a copy of the Annotated Checklist of the Birds of Georgia and refer to it frequently whether you're birding along the coast, the coastal plain or offshore waters, or whether you're birding in the mountains or the piedmont region of the state. Isn't it great to have so many habitats to choose from?

Reminders will be posted periodically when the deadlines approach for each season on our listserve, Georgia Birders Online (GABO). Feel free to send me any sightings you wish to submit at any time, and everyone is encouraged to submit rare bird sightings to the records committee with the appropriate documentation.

The "From The Field" reporting periods stated below have been designed to capture information about birds during spring migration, summer breeding, fall migration and the winter period.

Please submit input for the column within two months of the end of each reporting period. The reporting deadlines, therefore, are as follows:

- Spring (March through May) reports by July 31
- Summer (June and July) reports by September 30
- Fall (August through November reports by January 31
- Winter (December through February) reports by April 30
